Rabbi Michael Balinsky recently retired as the Executive Vice President of the Chicago Board of Rabbis, an organization representing 180 rabbis from all Jewish streams.

He is a past president of the Council of Religious Leaders of Metropolitan Chicago and serves on the Board of the Parliament of the World's Religions. He is also an active participant in a number of Jewish, Christian, and Muslim interfaith initiatives.

Rabbi Balinsky served as a Hillel director for 22 years, over 19 of them spent as the Director of the Louis and Saerree Fiedler Hillel Center at Northwestern University, following service for some two and a half years as the Associate Director of Hillel at the University of Michigan.
